## A Note from Rick

For the past several years, the Fairmount family has enjoyed a summertime tradition that folks around the country have enjoyed for decades – the tradition of summer reading. Many folks love to load up on books – or, these days, download books – for reading on vacation, sitting out on the porch or lounging by the pool. For this summer, I've lined up a fictional novel, a book from American history, and a piece of classic literature.

Since 2010, Fairmount has selected a Bible book to read through and study over the summer as well. This year our staff selected the letter of 1 John.

John talks a lot about love in his writings. In his Gospel, he uses the word “love” over 40 times. The most memorized verse in the New Testament begins with, “For God so loved...” John’s three letters are peppered with reminders of Godly love. In Revelation he warns the churches about losing their first love and falling in the footsteps of those who love the world.

The love that John encourages for the follower of Jesus is a **fearless** love. In 1 John 4:18, he writes, “There is no fear in love ...” Aren’t you glad that Jesus loved you without fear? That He left the comforts of heaven to live here on this earth. That He suffered the constant antagonism of His naysayers. That He endured verbal and physical abuse. That He died on a cross for you. THAT is fearless love. There is no fear in love. Love should indeed be... **fearless!**

That is the kind of love we need to have - a fearless love that changes the way we live – that changes our families – that changes our communities – and that ultimately changes the world.

We encourage you to keep this Fearless Devotional Guide with you all summer long. It is designed to help keep you in touch with our sermon series – when you are at home and when you may be on the road. I encourage you to be at Fairmount every Sunday you are in town. And then on Sunday or Monday, enjoy the devotion for that week that has been prepared by a member of our congregation. There is a **theme verse** that they have chosen – challenge yourself to memorize each theme verse. There are only 10 of them. Each day there is also a **Prayer Prompt** for you to keep the theme of that week in mind – and even space for you to jot down a few thoughts as the Scripture and the prayers inspire you.

We will also have a **Fearless Love Action** for you to consider each week. Fearless love means getting into action. Consider the action step we will share with you from the pulpit each Sunday and then drop me a note to let me know about your experiences. I can’t wait to hear how fearless love comes alive in our Fairmount family this summer.

Follow along with us as we read of this fearless love – and then do it. Get out and love fearlessly. I look forward to learning and loving along with you.

# A Brief Introduction to First John

Eternal life is at the heart of the Christian message. Jesus said, “I tell you the truth, whoever hears My word and believes Him who sent Me has eternal life and will not be condemned; he has crossed over from death to life” (John 5:24). It might even be said that eternal life is the principal benefit of being a Christian; without the promise of eternal life there is no compelling reason for following Jesus in the first place. But what does it mean to “have eternal life”? Is it something we have to wait for until after Jesus returns? Or is it something we can experience right now?

John the Apostle knew that many who had read his Gospel and believed the message of Jesus Christ would have questions such as these, and to one such group of believers he wrote the letter we call First John. These believers struggled with knowing whether or not they were truly experiencing “eternal life” in Christ the way they should. John begins and ends his letter with affirmations that we are living the “eternal life” right now, and sandwiched between those assurances he describes what such a life is all about, which he boils down to one thing in **1 John 4:18: Fearless Love**.

Each of the five brief chapters of 1 John contrasts the life of fearless love in Christ with the stumbling, hopeless, worldly existence of life outside of Christ. John builds one aspect of fearless love upon another, weaving them together into a complete picture of eternal life in Christ.

Chapter 1: Fearless love means walking in the light, not hiding in the darkness.

Chapter 2: Fearless love means loving your brother, not harboring worldly desires.

Chapter 3: Fearless love means striving for righteousness, not wallowing in sin.

Chapter 4: Fearless love means exercising discernment, not believing every “spiritual” voice you hear.

Chapter 5: Fearless love means overcoming through faith, not bowing to the influence of idols.

**Theme verse - 1 John 1:1**

***“That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked at and our hands have touched - this we proclaim concerning the Word of life.”***

Long-time Richmonders will remember the Logos bookstore down on Grace Street. I always thought that was such a clever name for a bookstore – especially a Christian bookstore. The word “logos” is the Greek word for... word. And, obviously, Logos Bookstore was very much filled with words! In my youth I spent many an hour there perusing the Christian books and magazines. When I returned to Fairmount as an adult, the friendly folks there were vital partners in supplying our church with the materials and curriculum that we consume in mass quantities. I miss that store and those good people.

John’s Gospel begins with, “In the beginning was the Word” – the Logos – “and the Word was with God, and the Word was God... the Word became flesh and dwelt among us.” He begins his first letter similarly: “That which was from the beginning... we proclaim concerning the Word of life” – the Logos.

The concept of logos is an interesting one that goes all the way back to Greek philosophy. For the Greek reader of John’s day, the logos was the cosmic principle that governed the universe – the very energy by which the universe was created. John co-opts the concept and gives the cosmic principle and creative force of the universe its proper name... Jesus. The very One who communicates the thoughts, power, and words of God Himself.

Many in John’s day were already doubting that the Son of God actually lived, breathed, died and rose from the dead. They believed Jesus to have been a spirit – a superhero – a demigod. John puts all that to rest. Jesus was both fully God and fully man. “He is the Logos ... and we saw Him, we heard Him, and we touched Him. We know... we were there. You can believe me.”

As we walk through 1 John, we will be reminded of the power of the Logos. We will be inspired to live like Him and to love like Him. We will be inspired to follow Him more closely and to put our eternal hope in Him daily. Jesus is not a legend. Jesus is not a fable. Jesus is real. Jesus changed my life.

My hope is that Jesus – the Logos – has changed your life as well.

## Prayer Prompts

**Day 1:** Thank God that He came to earth to live with us.

**Day 2:** Ask God to show you a way this week to make Jesus “real” to someone else.

**Day 3:** Pray that God will show Himself to you in a way that you hadn’t recognized Him before.

**Day 4:** Praise God that we don’t have to wonder what He wants – we have His words to tell us.

**Day 5:** Pray that you will find more opportunities to read God’s Word this summer.

**Day 6:** Ask God to help you finish a task that will make your “joy complete.”

**Day 7:** Thank God for all the ways you “saw” Him this past week.

## Fearless Love Action

**Theme verse - 1 John 1:5**

**“This is the message we have heard from Him and declare to you: God is light; in Him there is no darkness at all.”**

Isaac Newton’s Third Law of Motion states: For every action, there is an equal and opposite reaction. The website, “The Physics Classroom” explains Newton’s Third Law of Motion this way: “The statement means that in every interaction, there is a pair of forces acting on the two interacting objects. The size of the forces on the first object equals the size of the force on the second object. The direction of the force on the first object is opposite to the direction of the force on the second object. Forces always come in pairs - equal and opposite action-reaction force pairs.”

The Apostle John gives his own version of Newton’s Third Law of Motion in these verses of his letter. John describes two forces that are opposite: light and darkness. Light and darkness are metaphors for Good and Evil. Although these forces travel in the complete opposite direction from one another, they are not equal. Light is immensely more powerful than darkness. Light always triumphs over darkness. John reminds his readers that, “...the darkness is passing and the true light is already shining.” (2:8)

John likes to use the word “if”; using it eight times in these verses alone. Every time he uses “if”, he describes a subsequent consequence to either walking in the light or walking in the darkness. He is reminding us that the choice is ours. Light and darkness are two forces heading in the opposite direction. God and Good are light. Satan and Evil are darkness. We are given the freedom to choose which direction we are going to walk.

John describes for us what happens when we walk in the light:

- We have fellowship with one another. (1:7)
- Jesus’ blood purifies us from our sin. (1:7)
- God forgives our sins when we confess them to Him. (1:9)
- Jesus defends us to the Father when we do sin. (2:1)
- We are privileged to know God through our obedience. (2:3)
- God’s love is made complete in us. (2:5)
- We’re capable of seeing, so that we avoid stumbling. (2:10)

Commit yourself each day to walking with God in the light.

## Prayer Prompts

**Day 1:** Ask God to help you fearlessly walk in the light. (1:7)

**Day 2:** Confess to God any sin in your life and ask for His forgiveness. (1:9)

**Day 3:** Thank Jesus for His sacrifice for your sin. (2:2)

**Day 4:** Ask God for strength to obey His commands that you're struggling to obey. (2:3)

**Day 5:** Ask God to help you walk as Jesus did. (2:6)

**Day 6:** Thank God for the spiritual "fathers and mothers" in your life. (2:12, 14)

**Day 7:** Thank God for those who are just beginning to walk in the light; the "young" men and women of faith. (2:14)

## Fearless Love Action

**Theme verse - 1 John 2:15**

**“Do not love the world or anything in the world. If anyone loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him.”**

Wait a minute – we are not to love the world?! Doesn't the Bible teach that God so loved the world that He sent His Son (John 3:16)? And isn't Jesus called the Savior of the world (John 4:42)? And hasn't John himself just taught that Christians are to love – to love others in this world?

The world in this passage means the world which has forsaken the God who made it. It is the world apart from God. It is the godless world; the world that is totally at odds with God and the things of God. These things are listed in verse 16; “the desires of the flesh, the desires of the eyes and pride in possessions.” These are three worldly attitudes, ambitions, and actions we are indeed not to love!

King Solomon, in the Book of Ecclesiastes, shares about all the vanities of his worldly pursuits. In that book he admits he tried cheering himself with everything – everything that is still popular today – laughter, alcohol, houses, gardens, servants, money, music, and hundreds of beautiful women; and yet it was to him like someone “chasing after the wind.”

Solomon's passionate pursuits of worldly pleasures were like a man dying of thirst trying to quench his thirst by drinking a thousand handfuls of salty water. The more he drank, the thirstier he became. The more he drank, the closer death came upon him.

Solomon's point was that earthly pleasures cannot satisfy. John's point is that earthly desires cannot last. And so why should we, as devoted Christians, live for these things? Why lay up for ourselves treasures on earth - treasures that, as Jesus said (Matthew 6:19-20), moth and rust destroy; when we can lay up for ourselves treasures in heaven - treasures that are as permanent as God Himself?

You cannot love God and love the world. You cannot love that which the world loves most and then also try to put God first, whether it be that new house, that great job or the love for money. If God is tied for first in your heart, He is in fact placed last. God's greatest desire is that you love Him with all your heart and mind, and soul and strength!

## Prayer Prompts

**Day 1:** Pray for the lost of this world.

**Day 2:** Ask God to help you maintain a Christian attitude.

## Fearless Love Action

**Theme verse - 1 John 2:24**

**“See that what you have heard from the beginning remains in you. If it does, you also will remain in the Son and in the Father.”**

“Staying Power.” What does that phrase mean to you? Resolution. Stamina. Determination. Stick-to-it-iveness. Cambridge Online Dictionaries list all these as synonyms and related words. But I like their definition of staying power best: “If someone has staying power, they always manage to continue doing what they have to do until it is finished.”

That’s easier said than done. How many projects, diets, or New Year’s resolutions have I started but not finished? How many times have I walked away from a situation, not staying to see the relationship through or the goal realized?

Remain. Stay. This is what John urges us to do in 1 John 2:18-27. While there is much debate about his references here to antichrists, one thing is clear: the antichrists are the people who didn’t stay. They left. John is so passionate in urging us to remain that he uses the word many times. Though the word “remain” appears 5 times in the NIV 1984 translation, in the Greek language it actually appears 8 times in just 10 verses, and 2 times alone in 1 John 2:24, our theme verse.

“See that what you have heard from the beginning remains in you. If it does, you also will remain in the Son and in the Father.”

Sound familiar? It should. This very principle was one Jesus taught to John and the other disciples when He was with them. “Remain in Me, and I will remain in you.” (John 15:4a) John lovingly passed this teaching on to the church, so that we all might be encouraged to have staying power.

Did you see the movie “Shrek 2”? After the credits rolled, the filmmakers put in a special surprise scene where Dragon showed Donkey their little babies. All those who didn’t stay to the very end missed one of the best scenes of the movie! John urges us to remain. Show staying power so you don’t miss the best ending: eternal life!



**Theme verse - 1 John 3:2**

**“Dear friends, now we are children of God, and what we will be has not yet been made known. But we know that when He appears, we shall be like Him for we shall see Him as He is.”**

As children we all longed for growing up. Little girls would try on their mother’s shoes, hats and jewelry, dreaming of the day they would be a mommy. Spunky boys would sit in a tractor seat or behind the wheel of the car and dream of things they would do and places they would go when they became men. As a child, it didn’t matter if you were a male or female – you dreamt of being grown up.

In this week’s Scripture passage, the Apostle John repeatedly refers to adult Christians as “children.” He does so not in a negative way, but because they have not grown up yet. Spiritually, each adult Christian is just a child in the process of physically, spiritually and mentally maturing into the imitation of the Father.

This is why the Apostle says in this portion of 1 John to not sin or be led astray, but to do what is right. The only way adult Christians can move beyond spiritual childhood is to continue in the Father. Each Christian is to be transforming their mind by renewing it in His Word, offering our bodies holy and pleasing to God as living sacrifices, and not allowing our attitude to elevate us above others. Our goal, according to Matthew 5:48, is to “Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect.”

As spiritual children we can help the process of growing up by doing what the Apostle John suggests in his first epistle. However, the physical portion of what an adult Christian will be has to wait until Christ comes. Verse 2 of Chapter 3 teaches that when Christ appears, He will finalize our transformation and we shall be like Him. Hallelujah! As a spiritual child of the heavenly Father you should be dreaming of the day you finally grow up.

Thank you Father for Your lavish love upon Your children!

## Prayer Prompts

**Day 1:** Thank God for His lavish love that you might be called a child of God.

**Day 2:** Praise God that He sent His Son to take away your sins.

**Day 3:** Give God glory because His Son came to destroy the devil's work.

**Day 4:** Pray that you and others in your family will abide in Jesus until He appears.

**Day 5:** Ask God to provide you with the spiritual vision today to help a child of God stay the course.

**Day 6:** Pray that you might draw close to His heart and learn better how to love others.

**Day 7:** Confess your sins to Him and accept His forgiveness.

## Fearless Love Action

**Theme verse - 1 John 3:13**

**“Do not be surprised, my brothers and sisters, if the world hates you.”**

Evil is constantly combating us with hatred and lies. We as Christians are being portrayed as a hateful people. Satan has infiltrated all aspects of our culture by depicting followers of Christ as the hateful ones thereby turning people away from Jesus.

John tells us we should not be surprised if the world hates us. However, we should remember that we are not a hateful people, but the opposite, we are a loving people. We are the most generous and loving force on Earth because we follow the example of Christ. He laid down His life for us because He loves us. In turn we must love each other – friend, enemy, neighbor or stranger because they too are loved by Christ.

Do not allow yourself to think that Christians are a hateful people. The trap is set to lure us into the thought that we are in the wrong when we are not. We are loving people because Christ loves us. When we follow His example, hate cannot win.

A science test was given in a school one day and the question appeared, “What is the strongest force on Earth?” The student, whether to be sarcastic or not, answered “love”. While that wasn't the answer the teacher was looking for, it is the truth. Love is the strongest force on Earth. That love is established by our God and we who follow Him share in that love. We must not forget that. Love is Christ laying down His life for us so that we may be in Heaven one day.

Let us take that love and share it with the world!

## Fearless Love Action

**Theme verse - 1 John 4:5**

**“They are from the world and therefore speak from the viewpoint of the world, and the world listens to them.”**

Where do you get your news? Whether you watch MSNBC news or Fox news will determine a very different perspective of the actual news. As the old saying goes, “There are 3 sides to every argument: yours, mine, and the truth.” Where do you go for the truth?

I grew up in a “Christian home” and went to Christian school from K-8th grade. I was married in the church and attended church weekly. Yet when a Jehovah’s Witness came to my door and asked a few pointed questions, I couldn’t answer them! My “truth” had come from family, friends, sermons and Bible studies. But these were all “sides” of the truth. Opinions and personal interjections mixed into Bible stories.

Bible Studies are important. It’s good to be raised in a Christian home. However, if you never actually go to the source of truth, the Bible, you won’t be able to defend your faith. You won’t be able to test what the world tells you is truth. You won’t know the “why” behind the “what” you believe.

Jesus called Himself “the Truth” in John 14:6. If the Bible is the source of Truth, and Jesus is the Truth, we have to test everything we learn – in the world and in church – by God’s Word. Then we won’t be confused by the world, and what it calls truth; truth that changes from generation to generation, and truth that is “legislated” to be right, when it is Biblically wrong.

If you know Jesus, then you will know the Truth. And the Truth shall set you free.

## Prayer Prompts

**Day 1:** Pray for wisdom to recognize God's truth.

**Day 2:** Pray that you will hold on to God's teaching so that you may know the Truth.

## Fearless Love Action

**Theme verse - 1 John 4:18**

**“There is no fear in love. But perfect love drives out fear, because fear has to do with punishment. The one who fears is not made perfect in love.”**

Paul uses a special term for this love that God has for us and that we give back to Him. He uses the Greek word *agape* for love. It's not just a love where we acknowledge our personal need for one another or desire to be a part of each other's lives. This is an all consuming love that transcends moments of nearness and leads a person to do unexpected things. It has been known to lead a man up a mountainside to sacrifice his son to prove his love for God and it led God to send His Son down to earth as a sacrifice to prove His love of mankind.

But when you look up the English word “agape”, you get an interesting picture as well. Dictionary.com defines agape as: “with mouth wide open, as in wonder, surprise or eagerness”. While this isn't a Biblical definition, it too describes this love that God has for us. Imagine the wonder and surprise on the faces of those around Him when Jesus, out of great love, raised His friend Lazarus from the dead. Imagine the mouth wide open looks when, out of love, Jesus forgave a sinful woman at the well and healed a paralytic at the pool. Imagine the eagerness to learn more about Him when the earth shook as Jesus breathed His last and the centurion exclaimed, “Surely He was the Son of God”.

1 John 4:11 says, “Dear friends, since God so loved us, we ought to love one another.” Think what the world would be like if those who partake in the love of Jesus would share it with those around them as we are commanded. Imagine the wonder in the eyes of a child who may feel loved for the first time. The surprise on the faces of the homeless when someone reaches out with a warm blanket, a hot cup of coffee and a warm meal. The eagerness of someone who has heard so many times before how they have messed up their life, to hear for the first time that forgiveness awaits in the arms of Jesus.

Further along we read, “But if we love one another, God lives in us and His love is made complete in us”. The blessing of God's love was proven to us by His work on the cross. Through us, the blessing is shared with those who haven't yet made His acquaintance and those who need to feel what *Agape* Love truly is. Verse 18 says, “There is no fear in love.” Let's show the world how fearless we can be.

## Prayer Prompts

**Day 1:** Pray for the wisdom to know how to love fearlessly.

**Day 2:** Give a prayer of praise for the sacrificial love that Jesus showed on the cross.

**Day 3:** Pray for someone you know who is outside of Christ today.

**Day 4:** Pray that the Holy Spirit will lead you to do a selfless act today.

**Day 5:** Pray for your own family and your relationship with them today.

**Day 6:** Pray to know God's love even deeper than before.

**Day 7:** Pray for the completeness that God's love provides for everyone.

## Fearless Love Action

**Theme verse - 1 John 5:5**

**“Who is it that overcomes the world? Only the one who believes that Jesus is the Son of God.”**

We are overcomers. Professional American gospel and contemporary Christian recording artist, Mandisa, released her single, “Overcomer”, in June, 2013, to remind us that God wins! This refrain struck a chord in the international world.

*You're an overcomer; Stay in the fight 'til the final round;  
You're not going under 'cause God is holding you right now;  
You might be down for a moment  
Feeling like it's hopeless; That's when He reminds you  
That you're an overcomer; You're an overcomer*

What do we need to overcome? Fear or lack of courage? Anger or hatred? Despair or desperation? Relationship troubles? Health issues?

We want to overcome. We seek to overcome. We wait patiently and impatiently for victory. We are assured beyond our doubts and we believe. We listen for God’s testimony and we stand to witness.

When John wrote this New Testament letter in Ephesus long after Jesus’ death and resurrection, he specifically spends time in this passage speaking directly of God’s testimony to overcome. He wrote of God’s testimony to eternal life for those who believe. John wrote that God chose to send Jesus to overcome the world. God chose to send Jesus to be our example of faith, love, and obedience. Jesus chose to accept our sins to atone for our freedom, our victory, our overcoming.

God chose John to present His witness, His foundation of belief, and to state it in such a way that man cannot ignore its truth. To embrace this truth is to overcome death and have eternal life through Jesus Christ, His Son.

Who has overcome the world? Jesus has. We shall remain victorious because of Him, every day in every way. God inspired it, John wrote it, and I believe it. Jesus has overcome and we are the victors together forever.

## Prayer Prompts

- Day 1:** Pray for ways to show adoration to our Creator and Savior.
- Day 2:** Pray today for God to open our eyes and hearts to opportunities to serve and to love others and then to act on those opportunities.
- Day 3:** Pray today for forgiveness when our stubbornness gets directly in the way of obedience.
- Day 4:** Pray that we will remember that this earthly world is merely temporary and that God's promises always come true.
- Day 5:** Pray that we will reconcile with God on a daily basis.
- Day 6:** Pray for God to show you ways to extend His comfort to others who are grieving.
- Day 7:** Pray for God to show you what your true desires are and how to achieve them to help your relationship with God grow stronger.

## Fearless Love Action

**Theme verse - 1 John 5:13**

**“I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God so that you may know that you have eternal life.”**

You can hardly look at the skyline of a major city without noticing the spires scrabbling toward the heavens from the tops of multiple skyscrapers. Today, spires are mostly an architectural affectation meant only to add height. However, in the early 20th Century, as the first few skeletal behemoths began to rise from the ground, the spires had a much more practical purpose. They were designed as mooring stations for the fleets of dirigibles (blimps) that everyone knew would soon be carrying commuters from their country homes to offices in these new marvels of modern man.

How little we know what the future holds.

At the end of his missive to the churches, John assures followers of Christ that there are two things we can know of the future. First of all, we can know that we have eternal life. “I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God so that you may know that you have eternal life. This is the confidence we have in approaching God: that if we ask anything according to His will, He hears us. And if we know that He hears us - whatever we ask - we know that we have what we asked of Him.” (1 John 5:13-15)

Secondly, John assures us that we can know we are safe in the hands of God: “The One who was born of God keeps them safe, and the evil one cannot harm them. We know that we are children of God, and that the whole world is under the control of the evil one.” (1 John 5:18b-19)

Fear is a paralyzing reaction to the unknown or to a threat, but our future is known and there is no true threat the evil one can bring against us. How much easier it is to live and love fearlessly when our hope and confidence is in God!

## Prayer Prompts

- Day 1:** Thank God for eternal life that gives you a future without fear. (5:13)
- Day 2:** Pray for a situation to be resolved according to God's will. (5:14)
- Day 3:** Pray for a brother or sister in Christ who is struggling with sin. (5:16)
- Day 4:** Pray for strength in your own battles against sin. (5:18)
- Day 5:** Thank God for His ultimate control of the whole world. (5:19)
- Day 6:** Pray for greater understanding of God's Word and His will. (5:20)
